
LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

THANK YOU FOR YOUR WONDERFUL SUPPORT!

Last year was a challenging year for us at the Home as we faced increasing demand for our support and record-high costs. But your unwavering support helped us to achieve wonderful things!

In 2024 we:

- Found loving, forever homes for **229 dogs and cats**
- Reunited **103 missing pets** with worried owners
- Distributed 44,960kg of pet food to foodbanks and families across East and Central Scotland (this is more than the weight of a Boeing 737-800 airplane!)





- Our heroic volunteers contributed an amazing 2,830.5 hours of support
- Answered 26,876 calls on our helpline, offering support, emergency food packs and advice
- Provided a further 73,405 meals to pets through emergency food packs
- Helped **250 attendees** to become certified in Dog First Aid

And finally, a huge and heartfelt **THANK YOU** to everyone who so generously supported our Winter Appeal.

Together, you helped us raise £103,283 toward the care and protection of dogs, cats and their families.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A DOG TRAINER...



Every day is different, and you never know where you're going to get called!

8:30am-10am

I look after some of our dogs as well as training them, so the first thing each morning is cleaning kennels and feeding them.

10am-11am

Today we had a press visit so I headed to the paddock with one of our dogs, Cooper, to help film. He kept trying to chew the fluffy microphones, it was very funny!

11-12pm

Then it's back to check on my dogs. A few of them are being assessed, we take them into different environments like the office, training room or offsite to see how they cope. Today, we'll go into the office.

12pm-12:30pm

At lunch, I take my own dog, Maisie, for a walk. I rehomed her a few months ago. It's been fantastic to see how well she's settled in since she came home.

12:30pm-1pm

Then it's time for some admin. All our dogs are graded according to their behavioural needs but these can change, so I go through our forms and check in with the team make sure everything's up-to-date.

1pm-4:30pm

Every day is different at the Home. Some days I may be hosting training sessions for members of the public and their dogs, or assisting with a rehoming visit, helping the potential owners understand what the dog is like and how they can continue to work with them at home.

Today's rainy so it's a good, quiet day to take our more reactive dogs down to the beach. This is my favourite type of training as it's challenging. You have to help them find a better way to cope with their stresses. It's rewarding to see their progress and I always look forward to these afternoons!

Linda has rehomed many pets from us, and after her last cat passed, she found that her home was feeling empty. She came to visit Kevin: 'He just gave me a wee look and I knew I had to take him home.'

Kevin and Linda are now completely bonded. She tells us: '*It just makes my day when I come in from night shift, he's always there, sitting waiting at the door.*'

3 SIGNS THAT YOUR CAT IS HIDING PAIN



Cats are adept at hiding their pain. This may have once helped them to avoid predators in the wild, but now it just makes it hard to know when to call the vet. Here are three signs that your cat might be hiding pain.

I. CHANGES IN BEHAVIOUR

pay attention if your cat starts toileting outside of their tray, sleeping more or less than usual, refusing their food, or becoming vocal. Notice if a snoozy cat is suddenly restless, or if a cuddly cat is avoidant of touch. Any changes to behaviour are worth a closer eye.

2. PHYSICAL SYMPTOMS

Look out for swelling of joints, limping, floppiness of their tail or if their third eyelid is showing, as these could all be caused by pain.





3. FACIAL EXPRESSIONS Look out for outwardly rotated ears, squinty eyes and tension around the mouth and whiskers.

'BRINGING ODIN HOME FELT LIKE IT WAS MEANT TO BE, WE KNEW HE WAS THE ONE!'





When Odin first came to Edinburgh Dog and Cat Home, it took him a long time to warm up to anyone.

Our Animal Welfare team dedicated time to get to know him and to help him with his anxiety and stresses. After 161 days in our care, Odin is now in his forever home, with Sam and Graham who fell in love with him immediately.



Odin's kennel mum, Emily, describes caring for Odin when he arrived.

It took a few days before he seemed even remotely happy to see us. He was very stressed in the kennel.

Odin grew to completely trust his kennel parents and loved going on beach walks with them, but he was still nervous around others.

Everything's about Odin now. He just brings happiness, he really does. He makes us happy.

But, to everyone's surprise, when new owners Sam and Graham first came to visit him, they hit it off right away! Sam recalls, 'He just fell in love with Graham, even more than me which I was miffed about! He still is!'.

Odin is a lot more confident now and getting braver every day, 'it has been five and a half weeks now and he's so full of mischief and fun. You can tell that he's really happy. The best thing is that in the morning when he wakes up, he tells us a wee story, it's like he's delighted we're still here!'

Odin is working with a trainer as he still gets quite nervous on walks and Sam and Graham are committed to supporting him however he needs. At the moment, they're getting up early to take him out when the streets are quieter.

Sam says that rehoming Odin has 'brought so much joy to the house, everything's about Odin now. He just brings happiness, he really does. He makes us happy.'
